USEFUL ADVICE:

A lot of burglaries can be prevented. Most are committed by opportunist criminals and often the thief does not have to force his way in because a door or window has been left insecure.

Look at your home from the point of view of a burglar. Do you have an alarm fitted? Is there easy unlocked access to the rear? Are there window locks fitted? Is there external lighting available during darkness?

Most burglaries happen when a house or flat is empty. Don't advertise your absence when you're out, particularly for long periods during holidays. Make your home appear occupied.

Look after your car keys. Your home could be targeted for having a specific vehicle parked on your driveway. Don't leave your keys on view, particularly in hallways or near letterboxes and cat flaps.

Be aware of suspicious callers in your area. If you feel vulnerable use a spy hole in the door and make use of a door chain or bar.
